My Mother Beate Gordon's Wish "Gender Equality into the Japanese Constitution"

Beate Sirota Gordon worked tirelessly to have the principles of social security and gender equality included in the text of Japan's Constitution at the time of its drafting. Her tenacious efforts are said to have resulted in establishing the foundation for Japanese women to participate in society in postwar Japan. Professor Nicole A. Gordon, the daughter of Beate and also a legal scholar, will give an address on her mother's views and ideals which are embodied in Japan's Constitution and her mother's subsequent activities in Japan following her work on the Constitution. In the discussion to follow, participants, together with Professor Miyoko Tsujimura, a constitution specialist who is also familiar with Beate's activities, will consider issues in the promotion of gender equality today while reflecting on the role Beate played in Japan and its historical significance.

Twenty years on from the establishment of the Basic Law for a Gender Equal Society – Participation of women in the political field! Now is the time to meet the challenge!

Twenty years have passed since the establishment of the Basic Act for Gender Equal Society. In Japanese society, where there has been little effective progress in equality despite

improvement in legislation, last year the government promulgated and implemented the Act on Promotion of Gender Equality in the Political Field, and signs of some progress are becoming evident. The question now is: What kinds of initiatives will be effective in promoting progress in all areas of Japan? In light of outcomes and issues over the past 20 years, Professor Mari Osawa, who was involved in the drafting of the Basic Act for Gender Equal Society, will provide an opportunity for participants to consider the significance of increasing the participation of women in government as a specific method for promoting gender equality and the process of its realization from both a theoretical and practical perspective.

How was it that a young woman of 22 years of age was entrusted with such an important task? It was because Beate, who came to Japan with her family in 1929 as a young child, grew up witnessing first hand the pitiful status of Japanese women in society.
